Dear Community Member:

The ACLU of Northern California believes that voting is one of the most precious rights in our democracy. In California, many people have been effectively disenfranchised through misinformation or lack of accurate information about the right to vote. At the ACLU of Northern California, we are committed to ensuring the voting rights of all eligible California voters, particularly those with a criminal conviction.

Did you know that in California, you are eligible to vote EVEN if you have a felony conviction, as long as you are not in state prison or on parole? If your answer is no, you are not alone. Many people are unaware of California's felony disenfranchisement laws, which has created a vicious cycle of misinformation that leads to disenfranchisement. California cannot afford to let misinformation exclude hundreds of thousands of potential voters from the democratic process.

Over the past three years, the ACLU of Northern California has worked to set the record straight about voting with a criminal conviction. Unfortunately, it is clear that there continues to be widespread confusion about voting eligibility with a criminal conviction in California. In order to end the cycle of misinformation, it is critical that concerned individuals spread the word about the voting rights of all Californians in their communities.

That is where you come in! We have created this toolkit, *Promote the Vote: A Community Toolkit for Voter Education and Registration in California* to assist you in spreading the word about their voting rights in California.

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Understanding The Right To Vote In California

Introduction

Voting is one of the bedrocks of citizenship. However, past confusion about the voting rights of eligible voters in jail or on probation has resulted in the disenfranchisement of hundreds of thousands of Californians.

In 2006, along with the Social Justice Law Center, the ACLU of Northern California brought a lawsuit to clarify the confusion about the voting rights of individuals incarcerated in county jail facilities (*League of Women Voters of California v. McPherson*, 145 Cal. App. 4th 1469 (2006)). The ruling confirmed that individuals in jail as a condition of felony probation maintain the right to vote, in addition to all other eligible voters held in county jail facilities.

Since the ruling, we have created public education materials, launched public service announcements and spoken with county registrars and sheriffs as part of our *Every Vote Counts Campaign*. Despite these efforts and those of others throughout the state, confusion persists.

As part of our ongoing efforts to ensure that all eligible voters are aware of and able to exercise their right to vote, we have created this toolkit. *Promote the Vote: A Community Toolkit for Voter Education and Registration in California* lays out the voting requirements and processes for eligible voters with criminal convictions in addition to explaining how to host a voter registration drive. It is designed to complement advocacy efforts already in place as well as empower anyone interested in this issue.

Voting Rights and Eligibility Fact Sheet

Most people know that you have the right to vote in California if you are a citizen of the United States, a resident of California and at least 18 years of age at the time of the next election. But there is a widespread confusion about the impact a felony conviction has on this fundamental right.

So, here are the basic facts!

In California, you retain the right to vote with a felony conviction if:

- you are on probation;
- you have completed your parole; or
- you are sentenced to serve time in jail.

The **ONLY** time a felony conviction impacts your right to vote in California is if you are currently:

- in state prison; or
- on parole.

If you were convicted of a crime in another state or for a federal crime, you maintain the right to vote in California AS LONG AS you are a California resident and are not in prison or on parole in California.

Setting the Record Straight

There are many commonly held misconceptions about voting rights in California. Registering to vote and voting can seem like an intimidating process without accurate information, but it can be simple and easy with the right information. In this section, we set the record straight for many of the common myths about registering to vote and voting in California.

Myth: Once you have been convicted of a crime, you lose the right to vote for the rest of your life.

Fact: Not true! In California, some criminal convictions have no impact on your voting rights at all. Other kinds of convictions may temporarily take away your right to vote. The only time you are not eligible to vote in California is if you are in state prison or on parole. The moment you complete your parole, your right to vote is automatically restored—all you need to do is visit your local DMV, public library or elections office, and complete a Voter Registration Form. *(Election Code 2101, LOWV v. McPherson, 145 Cal. App. 4th 1469 (December 21, 2006))*

Myth: If you have a felony conviction on your record, you cannot vote.

Fact: You CAN vote! As long as you are not in state prison or on parole. The moment you complete your parole, your right to vote is automatically restored—all you need to do is visit your local DMV, public library or elections office, and complete a Voter Registration Form. *(Election Code 2101, LOWV v. McPherson, 145 Cal. App. 4th 1469 (December 21, 2006))* In California, your right to vote is *AUTOMATICALLY* restored once you are no longer in prison and have completed your parole. However, you are not automatically registered. In order to vote, you will need to register or re-register to vote.

Myth: The process to restore the right to vote is long and complicated.

Fact: Not true! In California, your right to vote is *AUTOMATICALLY* restored once you are no longer in prison and have completed your parole. In order to vote, you need to register or re-register to vote. *(Penal Code 4852.17)*

Myth: If you were registered to vote before going to state prison or serving parole, you do not need to re-register.

FACT: Not true! You will need to re-register to vote once you have completed your parole. In California, the names of individuals who are sent to state prison are removed from the list of eligible voters by the local elections office. Once you have completed your parole, you need to re-register to vote by visiting your local DMV, public library or elections office, and complete a Voter Registration Form. *(Election Code 2212)*

Myth: If you are being held in a county jail on felony probation, you cannot vote.

Fact: You CAN vote! The only time you are not eligible to vote in California is if you are in state prison or on parole. This means that you still have the right to vote if you are in jail for:

- 1. felony probation;
- 2. probation violation;
- 3. felony conviction that did not result in a prison sentence; or
- 4. awaiting trial or on trial for any crime.

(LOWV v. McPherson, 145 Cal. App. 4th 1469 (December 21, 2006))

Myth: You must be registered to vote to register others.

FACT: Not true! You can register others to vote *EVEN* if you are not registered yourself, under 18 years of age, or a resident of another area. All you need to do is complete and sign box 12 on every registration form you assist in completing. *(Election Code 2159.5)*

Myth: You must not take a position on a candidate or issue when registering people to vote.

Fact: Not true! The law does not restrict your free speech rights when registering people to vote.

Myth: I can register to vote on Election Day at my polling place.

Fact: Not true! You *MUST* be registered to vote at least 15 days before the next election. To register to vote you need to pick up a *free* Voter Registration Form at your local DMV, public library or elections office; complete, sign and date the form; and mail it to your county elections office by the registration deadline (15 days before the next election). You do not even need a stamp. Be sure to sign and date the form! *(Election Code 2107)*

Defining Terms

Ballot Initiative Process: The ballot initiative process, adopted in a 1911 special election by California voters, allows voters place an issue of concern directly on the ballot for voter approval or rejection, bypassing the Legislature. There are two types of initiatives that can be placed on the ballot: 1) statute revision, which requires signatures equal to five percent of the total votes cast for Governor in the preceding gubernatorial election, and 2) constitutional amendment, which requires signatures equal to eight percent of the Governor's total vote in the preceding gubernatorial election. *(Cal. Const., art. II, Section 8(a)).*

County Elections Official: A clerk, registrar of voters, elections supervisor or person who is charged with the duty of conducting an election within any county. (*Election Code 320*)

County Jail: A county facility for the detention of persons committed in order to secure their attendance as witnesses in criminal cases; persons charged with crime and committed for trial; the confinement of persons committed for contempt, or upon civil process, or by other authority of law; and persons sentenced to imprisonment therein upon a conviction for crime. *(Penal Code 4000)*

County Sheriff: A county officer who is charged with the duty of preserving the peace by sponsoring, supervising, or participating in any project of crime prevention, rehabilitation of persons previously convicted of crime, and/or suppressing delinquency. *(Government Code 26600)*

General Election: The election held throughout the state on the first Tuesday of November in each even-numbered year or any statewide election held on a regular election date as specified in California Election Code section 1000. (*Election Code 324*)

League of Women Voters v. McPherson: California Court of Appeals decision which held that the California State Constitution does not disenfranchise persons confined in a local facility as a condition of felony probation but only those persons confined in a state prison. *(145 Cal. App. 4th 1469 (December 21, 2006)*

Parole: The release of a prisoner by the Board of Prison Terms from imprisonment before the full sentence has been served on the condition that the prisoner abides by certain rules during the remainder of the sentence period. *(Penal Code 3040, 59 Am. Jur. 2d Pardon & Parole 6 (1987)).*

Permanent "Absentee" Voter: Any registered voter who applies for and receives the ability to cast a ballot in any way other than at the polling place. *(Election Codes 300, 3201)*

Primary Election: Includes all primary nominating elections provided for by the California Elections Code including the "Presidential primary" held on the first Tuesday in February every four years, and at which delegations to national party conventions are to be chosen. *(Election Code 340-341)*

Probation: The suspension of a sentence of confinement based on the conditional and revocable release in the community under the supervision of a probation officer. *(Penal Code 1203)*

Special election: A special election or statewide special election is held to: (1) fill a political office that has become vacant between regularly-scheduled elections; (2) to recall elected officials from office; or (3) to repeal or enact state laws through a ballot initiative. A special election may be called by the Governor when any initiative, recall or referendum presented to the Secretary of State is found to qualify. *(Cal. Const., art II, Section 8).*

State Prison: A state facility of confinement for convicted criminals, especially felons. *(Black's Law Dictionary 8th Ed. 2004)*

Vote-By-Mail Ballot Application: A vote by mail ballot application can be obtained from a county elections official and must contain the applicant's name at length, residence address, address where ballot is to be mailed, if different from the place of residence, the name and date of the election for which you are applying (e.g., November 4, 2008, Presidential Election) and the signature of the applicant. *(Election Code 3006)*

Voter Registration Drive: The act of acquiring voter registration applications for distribution to citizens and/or assisting applicants with the completion or submission of their voter registration applications.

Vote-By-Mail Ballot: A ballot which allows a registered voter to vote without having to travel to a polling place. Vote-by-mail ballots must be returned by mail, to an elections office or polling place within your county of residence no later than 8 p.m. on Election Day. *(Elections Codes 3017, 3020, 14212)*

Voter Registration Form: The form a citizen must complete and return to an elections official in order to cast a vote in any state and/or federal election.

Take Action! Make Every Voice In Your Community Heard

You know who can vote in California—so, now what? Spread the word!

There are many ways to ensure Californians know their voting rights and are able to exercise those rights in every local, state and federal election. One important way is to talk to your friends, family and colleagues. Make sure that they are correctly informed about voting in California. If you want to get in involved in voter outreach and education, a simple, easy and fun way is to host a voter registration drive in your community.

In this section, you will find the information you need to host a Voter Registration Drive in your community. In addition, we have included the contact information for your local county elections official, sample registration forms and our public education materials in this toolkit.

Hosting a Registration Drive

Hosting a voter registration drive in your community is a simple, easy and effective way to inform eligible voters of their voting rights and register them to vote. The first step is to contact your local elections office for the important information and materials that you will need.

Here are a few things to keep in mind when preparing to host a voter registration drive:

- you do not need to be a registered voter, a particular age, or a resident of the area to register others to vote;
- you must complete and sign box 12 of each Voter Registration Form that you assist a voter in completing;
- you may conduct partisan political activity while registering people to vote;
- you may not refuse to give anyone a Voter Registration Form; and
- you may not accept Voter Registration Forms that you know are fraudulent.

Registration Tips and Deadlines

Here are some helpful tips to get you started in hosting a registration drive in your community:

The Form You Need

In order to register to vote, individuals must complete a **Voter Registration Form**. If you are preparing a registration drive, you can pick up Voter Registration Forms from your local county elections official. *(Election Code Section 2158)* A list of California county elections officials is included in this toolkit.

<u>Re-Registering to Vote</u>

In some instances, individuals must re-register to vote. When hosting a registration drive, you should be comfortable explaining to individuals when they need to re-register.

An eligible voter must re-register to vote:

- whenever they change their residence address, which includes upon completion of parole; or
- if they wish to change their political party affiliation.

An eligible voter does NOT need to re-register to vote if they did not vote in the last election, and have not changed their residence address. A registration is permanent if the voter remains active and responds to confirmation letters from elections officials. *(Elections Code 2116)*

Identification Number

Federal and state law require that a Voter Registration Form include an identifying number that is unique to the voter—whether a driver's license, state identification card, or the last four digits of the voter's social security number. If a voter does not have a driver's license, state identification card, or social security number, they will be assigned a unique identifier by their county elections official. *(Elections Code Section 2150* and *Help America Vote Act of 2002)*

The 3 Ways to Submit a Voter Registration Form

A completed Voter Registration Form may be returned to the local county elections office in three ways: (1) in person; (2) by mail; or (3) through a third party.

If you are submitting Voter Registration Forms for others, you MUST return the form either in person to the county elections office or by mail within 3 days of receiving it from the voter (excluding Saturdays, Sundays, and state holidays). *(Election Code Sections* 2138 and 18103)

Residence vs. Mailing Address

The residence address (Box 2) is the address the voter considers to be their residence or where the voter lives. If they do not have a residence, they can describe the location (cross-streets) of where they live (Box 3). The mailing address (Box 4) is the location where the voter receives his or her mail, if different than his or her residence address. *(Elections Code Section 2150 and Secretary of State Guide to Voter Registration in California, 2006)*

Signature and Date

Each Voter Registration Form must be signed and dated by the voter. *(Elections Code 2150)*

Registration Form Receipt

The Voter Registration Form includes a receipt at the bottom of the form. This receipt has the serial number of the form and allows the voter to track their registration.

If you are *SUBMITTING* Voter Registration Forms for others, you must complete and sign the receipt and hand it to the voter.

If you are *ASSISTING* someone complete their Voter Registration Form, you MUST sign and date the form (Box 12). *(Election Code Section 2150)*

Forwarding the Form

Any local county elections office MUST forward the Voter Registration Form of a voter who resides in another county to that other county's elections office. *(Election Code Section 2114)*

Important Deadlines

REGISTRATION DEADLINE: In order for an individual to vote in the next election, their Voter Registration Form must be received by the local elections official OR postmarked no later than 15 days before the next election. *(Election Code Sections 2102 and 2107).*

Commonly Asked Questions When Hosting a Voter Registration Drive

Concerned that you will be asked questions that you may not know the answer to? Do not worry! We have highlighted some of the commonly asked questions about voter registration in California.

When hosting a Voter Registration Drive, take this Toolkit with you so you have the answers at your fingertips. If you are ever unsure of the answer to a question, do not attempt at the answer. Just let the person know that they should consult the county elections official and give them the number.

Question: Who can register to vote?

Answer: In order to register to vote, a person must:

- be a citizen of the United States;
- be a resident of California;
- be at least 18 years of age as of the day of the next election;
- not be in state prison or on parole for the conviction of a felony; and
- not have been legally judged mentally incompetent by an appropriate court.

Question: What is the deadline to register to vote?

Answer: The deadline to register to vote is 15 days prior to each local and statewide Election Day.

Question: Can an ex-felon register to vote and vote?

Answer: An ex-felon can register to vote and vote if he/she is not in state prison or on parole for a felony conviction.



Question: I am on parole for a felony. May I register to vote?

Answer: No. However, once you complete your parole, your right to vote is automatically restored. All you need to do is register to vote.

Question: I have just moved. Should I re-register?

Answer: Yes. Your voter registration should always reflect your current residence address.

Question: I have moved. May I change my address over the phone? Answer: No. You should notify your county elections official by mail.

Question: I did not vote in the last election. Do I need to re-register?

Answer: In general, you are registered to vote for as long as you remain at the same residence address. If you have not voted in the last several elections, you may receive a request to confirm that you have not moved. If you are unsure if you are registered, you can check the status of your voter registration by contacting your local elections official.

Question: I am away at school. Do I use my college or my parents' address?

Answer: You may use whichever address you consider to be your residence, but not both.

Question: My spouse/partner is out of town but needs to register. May I sign her/him up?

Answer: No. They must sign the card themselves under penalty of perjury. They can complete the Voter Registration Form and mail it from wherever they are. They may also request a Voter Registration Form online at the Secretary of State's website: <u>http://www.ss.ca.gov/elections_vr.htm</u>.

Question: I sent in my voter registration form a month ago and I still do not know where to vote. Whom should I speak with to check whether or not I am registered? Answer: To inquire about your voter registration status and your local polling place, you must call your local county elections official.

Question: Where do I send my voter registration form after I fill it out?

Answer: The form should be pre-addressed already. Generally, it goes to your county elections official, but if it is a statewide form (*i.e.,* not specific to one county), it may go to the Secretary of State and then forwarded to the appropriate county elections office.

Question: I registered at the DMV and the county says I am not registered. What can I do?

Answer: Check with your county elections official. Their address can be found by clicking on "Who is My County Elections Official?" on the following webpage http://www.sos.ca.gov/elections/voter_ed.htm. The county will ask for documentation to establish when and where you registered, and in many cases has a way to verify the potential registration through the Department of Motor Vehicles.

Question: I do not want to provide my driver's license number or do not have one. May I register to vote?

Answer: If you have a driver's license or state identification card, you must provide the number. If you have neither, you must provide the last four digits of your Social Security Number. If you have none of these, a unique identifier will be assigned to you.

Question: I will be 18-years old on Election Day, but will only be 17-years old by the registration deadline. May I register to vote?

Answer: Yes, since you will be 18 years of age on or before the election date.

Question: I want to change political parties. Do I need to re-register?

Answer: Yes. Be certain to complete Box 10 of the Voter Registration Form with your previous registration information.


Question: If a person does not vote in a primary election, can they vote in the following November general election? Answer: Yes.

Question: How can I cancel my California voter registration?

Answer: You must contact your county elections office to cancel your voter registration.






NEW California Statewide Voter Registration Form^{*}
