# Lessons from the Portland Solution

### **PORTLAND'S GOALS**

(as set by Mayor & City Council)

- 1. Prevent and investigate terrorism
- 2. Protect civil rights and civil liberties
- 3. Provide for an open and inclusive community

## **PROBLEMS:**

- 1. Oregon standards are stronger than federal guidelines for FBI
- 2. The above goals *cannot* be achieved under the standard FBI JTTF MOU

#### THE RESOLUTION SOLUTION:

(enacted unanimously April 28, 2011)

- 1. Permits local police JTTF participation *only* when consistent with state and local standards.
- 2. Maintains local control over local police by:
  - Assigning officers to JTTF "as needed"
  - Providing direct local supervision
- 3. Guarantees local civilian oversight by:
  - Involving commissioner in charge of police (mayor) under high level security clearance
  - Permitting local JTTF officers' consultations with city attorney
  - Requiring annual public reports on local JTTF activity
  - Mandating public disclosure of implementing procedures
  - Prohibiting changes without public hearing and Council vote

# **RESULTS:**

- Prevent and investigate terrorism
- 2. Protect civil rights and civil liberties
- 3. Provide for an open and inclusive community

#### **REACTIONS:**

- 1. **U.S. Dept. of Justice** (per U.S. Attorney for Oregon, Dwight Holton) –
- "A huge win for our efforts to combat terror"
- Welcomes the "sensible and effective civil rights protections"
- 2. Portland Mayor Sam Adams -
- "We tried to strike a balance. We reject the false choice that we can only protect civil liberties and civil rights or we can only prevent terrorism. We can do both."
- 3. Portland Police Chief Mike Reese –

The resolution "allows for local oversight and provides for local examination of JTTF investigations."

- ACLU (per Legislative Director for ACLU of Oregon, Andrea Meyer) –
- "Not perfect" but "a thoughtful framework (for) keep(ing) our community safe while also ensuring that Portland police stay within the confines of the Oregon . . . laws."
